Rivalry hype has already started

PA/WA football game is sometimes biggest game of year

Nick Barbieri knows the excitement starts now, not Friday night.

The first-year Pittston Area head coach is one of many people in the Pittston Area-Wyoming Area rivalry who's been attached to the game for years, or even decades, in various capacities.

Bob Barbieri, Nick's father, was a head coach in the second-most games in the rivalry as the most successful coach in Pittston Area history, leading the Patri-

ots from their creation in 1966 through 23 seasons.

"I always remember it being such a big week," Nick Barbieri said. "The whole season was exciting, but this week was always the biggest week of the year."

Bob's position had Nick involved from the time he was a young boy, long before he suited up for the Patriots.

"I remember from when I was a waterboy and ballboy on the sidelines," Nick said. "Everything just seemed like it was a bigger experience for this week."

The Patriots and Warriors will spend the week anticipating Friday night's matchup at Wyoming Area's Jake Sobeski Stadium.

Across the sideline from Nick, Randy Spencer is no stranger to the game that he last played in 30 years ago.

Spencer has been coaching at his alma mater for 26 years, including the last 10 as head coach.

"I've had tremendous experiences with this rivalry," Spencer said. "It's just such a great experience, regardless

of whether it's playing or having the opportunity to coach for several years.

"Obviously, it's great to win, but it's always a game of substance. It brings the best genuinely out of both teams."

The series started when both schools formed in 1966 and has ended most regular seasons since.

Wyoming Area has a 29-23 series lead.

Many of the games through the years have been played with one team as a distinct favorite, but the teams appear much more evenly matched this year.

Going into the ninth week of the season – the last before the rivals meet – Pittston Area (4-4) was seventh and Wyoming Area (3-5) was eighth out of the 11 teams in the District 2 Class 4A playoff standings.

Although Wyoming Area had one fewer win, the Warriors had generally been much more competitive in their defeats with a one-point overtime loss and three losses by three points.

Through it all, the players and fans on both sides have been well aware of the developments in their rival's season.

"The closeness of the communities lends itself to that," Spencer said.

After all, Spencer said, the players that line up across from each

other Friday night are not always rivals. For example, many have played and even a few still do play together as teammates in summer baseball.

"There's a familiarity with them being right across the river," Barbieri said.

So, the Warriors know all about Pittston Area's senior-laden team built around its many weapons in the passing game.

And, the Patriots are quite familiar with Wyoming Area's young talent and the defensive toughness that has kept them in many tight, low-scoring games.

"Everybody's got one eye on the other and everybody's keeping track of each other," Spencer said. "You hope everybody's successful except for that one game."

Through eight games, Wyoming Area had given up 124 points, the second-lowest total of the Wyoming Valley Conference's 17 teams.

Pittston Area had scored 210, the sixth-highest point total.

Senior Walter Coles leads the Pittston Area passing game with 96 completions in 194 attempts for 1,491 yards and 15 touchdowns with just six interceptions.

While Coles has been prolific, Wyoming Area's Dominic DeLuca has been efficient.

DeLuca, already a defensive starter as a

sophomore, was pressed into starting quarterback duties minutes into the season. He has hit 76 of 132 passes (57.6 percent) for 1,004 yards, 13 touchdowns and just four interceptions.

The teams feature multiple options in the passing game, headed by the WVC Class 4A Division leaders in receptions and receiving yards.

Wyoming Area's Marc Anthony Minichello, the remaining four-year starter for the Warriors after quarterback P.J. Angeli went out with an injury, has 38 catches for 407 yards and six touchdowns.

Pittston Area's Kevin Krawczyk, who is also having an outstanding season as a strong safety, has turned his 34 catches into 631 yards and nine touchdowns.

"They had established athletes and skill guys coming into the season and they have certainly played well and are in position to make the playoffs," Spencer said.

The Warriors spread the ball around more in the running game while the Patriots are led by Keemar Woodruff with 539 yards and six touchdowns rushing.

Shane Eslick leads Wyoming Area in tackles, tackles for losses and sacks.

PITTSTON AREA SEASON RECAP

Patriots' offense is stronger than their defense

Pittston Area still tends to pass more effectively than it runs. The Patriots offense is usually stronger than the defense.

In the most important ways, however, the 2017 Pittston Area football season has been different than last year and other recent seasons.

The Patriots have surpassed three wins in a season for the first time in the 2010s.

Here's a week-by-week look back at the season going into this weekend's home finale against Coughlin and the Oct.



Barbieri

27 regular-season finale at Wyoming Area.

**CRESTWOOD
34-15**

Loss

Crestwood spoiled Nick Barbieri's head coaching debut by limiting the Patriots to 154 yards.

The Comets scored the game's first 14 points and opened a 34-7 lead.

**At Tunkhannock
36-20 Win**

The veteran passing combination of Walter Coles to Kevin Krawczyk

led the win, the first of Barbieri's career.

"We needed a positive turnaround," Barbieri said. "It was good for the kids."

Coles passed for 254 yards and three touchdowns and took his only carry 47 yards for another touchdown that opened the scoring.

Krawczyk caught three passes for 124 yards, including a 77-yarder for a 14-0 halftime lead. He also led the defense with 12 tackles, three assists, an interception and a broken-up pass.

**At Dallas
38-7 Loss**

Dallas converted

fumbles into two touchdowns in 12 seconds to start the scoring midway through the first quarter.

The Mountaineers put the game away by using their ground game to hold the ball for more than 11 of the 12 minutes in the fourth quarter.

Matt Starinsky was in on 22 tackles in the loss.

**At Valley View
58-20 Loss**

Valley View converted turnovers into 27 points, helping it break away in a game that was competitive through halftime.

"In our three losses, we've turned the ball over way too many

times," Barbieri said. "When we stop doing that, we'll start competing."

The Cougars ran for 360 yards.

Pittston Area cut a 28-7 deficit to 34-20 at halftime with the help of a score with 4.2 seconds left in the second quarter.

**GAR
35-13 Win**

The Pittston Area defense had a big night, keeping GAR from getting closer than the 33-yard line while allowing just 32 yards total offense up to the 7:07 mark in the fourth quarter when the game went

to the Mercy Rule.

Walter Coles passed for 200 yards and four touchdowns, two each to Dorien Ryans and Andrew Krawczyk, while Keemar Woodruff rushed for 107 yards and a touchdown.

Tyler Ferlick led the defensive effort with seven tackles, including two for losses.

**At Abington Heights
51-34 Win**

Passing and offense were definitely on display when Pittston Area returned to the .500 mark for the second time on the season.

The Patriots scored





34 points in the second quarter when the teams traded the lead seven times on the way to Pittston Area's 37-27 halftime lead.

Coles was 24-for-32 passing for 374 yards and three touchdowns while also running for two scores. He outduelled Abington Heights quarterback George Tinsley, who was 23-for-40 for 369 yards and four touchdowns.

Kevin Krawczyk caught 10 passes for 239 yards, including second-quarter touchdowns of 81 and 39 yards.

Woodruff added 106 yards on 27 carries as part of the 558 yards of total offense by the Patriots.

BERWICK 36-0 Loss

Wyoming Valley Conference Class 4A Division leader Berwick got its starting quarterback Jared Marshman back from injury for the first time all season.

Marshman passed for 175 yards and three touchdowns while also

running for a score. He led the Bulldogs to five touchdowns in a span of 13:13 after the game had remained in a scoreless tie past the midway point of the second quarter.

Berwick's defense limited the usually potent Pittston Area offense to four first downs, 27 yards rushing and 72 yards total offense.

NANTICOKE 46-21 Win

Woodruff scored three touchdowns in a span of 5:11 to end the first quarter and start the second quarter, opening leads of 21-0 and 27-7 for the Patriots.

Between his first two touchdowns, Woodruff intercepted a pass.

Coles passed for 245 yards, including touchdowns to Woodruff, Kevin Krawczyk and Wallace.

The win improved Pittston Area's record to 4-4, reaching that win level for the first time since 2009. The team had won just two games combined in the 2015 and 2016 seasons.





WYOMING AREA SEASON RECAP

Close calls and tough losses highlight Warriors' season

From the beginning, the Wyoming Area season has been marked by close calls and tough losses.

It also, however, has featured the quick development of a talented sophomore class that has helped make sure the Warriors, coached by Randy Spencer, did not have to simply wait for the future to find some success on the football field.

Here's a week-by-week look back at the season going into this weekend's home game with Williamsport that was to serve as the final preparation before the annual season-ending game against cross-river rival Pittston Area.

At Wallenpaupack 7-3 Win

Four plays into the season, the master plan changed when four-year starter P.J. Angeli, the team's starting quarterback and an all-around defensive force, went out with a torn anterior cruciate ligament that resulted in season-ending knee surgery.

Playing a more-experienced opponent on the road, the Warriors came up with a series of defensive plays, many of them by sophomore linebackers F.J. Braccini and Corey Mruk, to hold on for a victory in the first game for the defending Wyoming Valley Conference Class 4A Division

champions. "Defensively, we played as well as we could possibly play,"

Wyoming Area coach Randy Spencer said.

At Crestwood 21-18 Loss

A frustrating stretch of the season began when Wyoming Area led in most statistical categories but fell when Kevin Klusewitz broke a 55-yard run midway through the fourth quarter for the only touchdown of the second half.

Dominic DeLuca, the sophomore who took over at quarterback, threw for 125 yards and three touchdowns. Marc Anthony Minichello caught seven passes for 107 yards and two of the touchdowns.

BERWICK 17-14 Loss

Wyoming Area had a 14-3 lead midway through the fourth quarter of its home opener against the current Wyoming Valley Conference Class 4A Division leaders.

Teagan Wilk's 81-yard punt return, followed by Damon Beckhorn's 44-yard run with 3:02 left, brought the Bulldogs back.

"The game is 48 minutes, not 42 minutes," Spencer said.

The Warriors reached the Bulldogs' 27 on their

own comeback attempt before losing the ball on downs.

At Coughlin 17-14 Loss

A big night by bruising Coughlin running back Jake Cole led to a third straight, three-point loss for Wyoming Area.

"We're working hard and we're not getting paid off," Spencer said after Cole carried 26 times for 204 yards and both his team's touchdowns.

Minichello's 90-yard kickoff return was the only score by Wyoming Area

At Scranton Prep 24-0 Loss

Undefeated and state-ranked Scranton Prep handed Wyoming Area its only convincing loss of the season.

Shane Eslick, the team's season tackle leader, was in on 11 tackles, including two for losses.

The game was the first time since 2008 that Wyoming Area had been shut out.

HANOVER AREA 54-14 Win

Wyoming Area ended its four-game losing streak by getting touchdowns from eight different players, including seven who were celebrat-

ing Senior Night.

DeLuca hit nine of 12 passes for 215 yards and four touchdowns and also carried three times for 44 yards.

At GAR 44-7 Win

The Warriors rolled over a winless opponent for the second straight week, running out to a 23-0 lead less than a minute into the second quarter.

Eslick took a screen pass from DeLuca 38 yards, Cameron Carr provided a safety with a tackle in the end zone and DeLuca connected with Minichello for touchdowns of 28 and

30 yards during the fast start.

DALLAS 21-20 Loss

Dallas stopped a two-point conversion attempt in overtime to defeat Wyoming Area.

The Warriors overcame a 14-0 deficit on DeLuca touchdown passes to Eslick and Steven Yordy.

After Dallas scored a touchdown and kicked the extra point on its possession in the 10-yard line overtime tiebreaker, Wyoming Area scored on a Donovan O'Boyle run.



Falcone Award to be presented for 40th time

Carmelo Falcone was big supporter of area football teams

Brian Miles made history in the 2015 and 2016 Wyoming Area-Pittston Area football game.

The workhorse running back became the first player to win consecutive Carmelo Falcone Awards as the Most Valuable Player in the rivalry game.

Miles ran for 169 yards and three touchdowns in 2015 when the Warriors rolled over the Patriots, 42-10. He followed that up with 142 yards and three more touchdowns last season, including two that broke open a close game in a 46-20 win at Charley Trippi Stadium.

As a linebacker, Miles also made five tackles in last year's win.

"A lot of great players have won this, so it means a lot to me," Miles said on the field immediately after receiving last year's award.

The Falcone Award will be presented for the 40th time Friday night when Pittston Area travels to Wyoming Area for the latest renewal of the rivalry.

"It's another very special aspect of the game and the players that have won it on both sides have been very deserving,"

Wyoming Area coach Randy Spencer said. "It's such a nice way to recognize that type of effort in that type of game."

Spencer said Miles fit

well within the group of winners that has included 23 Warriors and 16 Patriots.

"Brian was an outstanding player for us," Wyoming Area coach Randy Spencer said. "He played very hard. He played on an outstanding team last year; a championship team."

Charlie McDermott from Wyoming Area won the first award in 1978. Mike Sobeski became Pittston Area's first winner the next year.

Kyle Gattuso, in 2013, was the last Pittston Area recipient of the award.

The repeat winners have all been on the Wyoming Area side.

Jim Pizano, in 1991 and 1993, and Nick O'Brien, in 2010 and 2012, each won the

award in both their sophomore and senior seasons, but nobody had gone back-to-back before Miles.

Brothers Gary and Greg Dolhon, in 1980 and 1988, also earned the award while playing at Wyoming Area. Greg Dolhon is currently the head coach at North Pocono, a potential District 2 Class 4A playoff opponent for either the Warriors or Patriots.

Carmelo Falcone died in 1977 and the first award was presented in his name the following year. Carmelo's son, Sam Falcone, presents the award, which is organized on a yearly basis by Carmelo's grandson, Carmen Falcone.

Although he never played football, Carmelo Falcone, who owned
